## PRESIDENT'S Message



It is with considerable pleasure that I inform you that your college has recently received a significant collection of art from one of Canada's foremost landscape artists, Manly

MacDonald. The gift of a large number of paintings and drawings was made by his son, Duncan MacDonald, who wished that his father's art be studied and appreciated by as many people as possible. Manly MacDonald was born in Prince Edward County and the Quinte Region was the focus of many of his paintings. The first showing of part of this collection was held in April in the new library, The Parrott Centre, and was attended by Duncan and his wife Barbara. Some pieces of this collection remain on permanent display in the Centre. Please stop by to view these wonderful works of art.


The frenetic construction activity of the past two years is over...I hope. The new library, The Parrott Centre, the student computer lab, the Wilkinson Lecture Theatre and new classrooms are now fully operational and have greatly improved the quality of the learning environment at Loyalist College. The College is now in the midst of a review to do what we can, with very limited resources, to refurbish and spruce up some of the older classrooms and facilities. At the May meeting of the Board of Governors, I announced plans for a new athletic/recreational complex on campus. This will be a partnership with one or more of our surrounding communities as it would be financially impossible to fund a project of this scope on our own. The College has set aside 20 acres of land for the complex that would house an aquatic facility, three gymnasias, an indoor track and fitness centre. It will have seating capacity for both the pool and gym that would enable the College and the community to host provincial and national athletic events. If there are alumni

who are interested in helping the College develop the concept of this facility, please contact me at dauld@loyalisc.on.ca.

The Provincial budget was a bittersweet message. There was very little financial support for colleges in 2004-5. However, the Government did announce the appointment of the Hon. Bob Rae, former Premier of Ontario, to chair a review of post-secondary funding in Ontario. Mr. Rae noted, publicly, that Ontario colleges are one of the lowest funded post-secondary systems in North America and there had to be an improvement in the funding. Mr. Rae has been asked to complete his review and make a recommendation by December 2004. I would urge you to write to Mr. Rae at the Ministry of Colleges and Universities and express your concern about the level of funding for Ontario's college system. Your voice counts.

# SuperBuild Brings *Super Look* to Loyalist

After months of construction, Loyalist has had the excitement of hosting a series of grand openings.

These celebrations have included the openings of **The Parrott Centre**, (the College's new Library and Information Resource Centre), the **Student Access Centre** and **The Wilkinson Lecture Theatre** – each designed to enhance the learning environment at Loyalist.

**The Parrott Centre** is a beautiful, modern, open concept library and resource centre. It houses 32,400 books, 310 periodical titles, and 1,900 videos, as well as CD-Rom research titles and on-line databases. The facility is named The Parrott Centre in recognition of a \$1 million gift from Mr. and Mrs. John M. Parrott.

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The new **Student Access Lab (SAL)** held its official ribbon-cutting ceremony in February. This new 4,800 square foot lab provides students with access to an additional 124 computers, seven scanners and 12 printers.



The most recent official opening was **The Wilkinson Lecture Theatre**. This 90-seat theatre is equipped with a full range of audiovisual and computer networking equipment.

All 53 graduates of the final Diploma Nursing Program who wrote their nursing registration examinations for the College of Nurses of Ontario in January, 2004 were successful. The registration examinations are mandatory for nurses to practice in Ontario and Loyalist graduates have earned a reputation for scoring at or above the provincial and national averages. The College has built a 30-year tradition of excellence with the Diploma Nursing Program and is very proud of the new Brock University/Loyalist College Degree partnership, which is continuing this tradition. Nursing students are now able to take the first two years of their Nursing Degree at Loyalist College after which they enroll at Brock University for years three and four, graduating with their Bachelor of Science in Nursing.

There are three separate Premier Awards and a General Excellence category designed specifically for college/university newspapers.

In the Premier Award Student Photography category, First Place was awarded to **Jill Kitchener** and Second Place went to **Luke Hendry** for photographs from the Loyalist College Pioneer. First Place in the College/University Online Edition was

# Career Excellence and Contributions to Communities Earn Graduates Nominations for Provincial Premier's Awards



Selected for their career excellence and the contributions they have made to their communities, these individuals are outstanding examples of the impressive scope and richness of the training and education provided by the province's community colleges.*

Janet Baragar is a graduate of the 1976 Nursing Program and is now the Director of Maternal Child and Surgical Services for Quinte Healthcare. As part of this position she is responsible for corporate administration and management of inpatient and ambulatory services at three sites. In addition to this demanding role, Janet is an active volunteer in her community through figure skating, hockey and the Heart and Stroke Foundation.

A graduate of both Radio Broadcasting (1999) and Broadcast Journalism (2000), Mike Ebbeling is the afternoon news anchor-reporter for CKDR Radio in Dryden. He is also the play-by-play announcer for the Dryden Eagle High School and Dryden Ice Dog Junior A hockey games. Named Dryden's Employee of the Year in the Service Sector in 2003 and honoured by the city for his work during a chlorine spill at the sawmill, Mike continues to contribute to the Dryden community by sitting on the Board of Directors for Big Brothers, Big Sisters and Crime Stoppers.



As Editor-in-Chief of *The Grand River Valley Newspapers*, Lynn Haddrall, a 1983 Print Journalism graduate, is one of a few women in Canada to hold this position at a daily newspaper. Since her arrival in Kitchener, The Record has received the prestigious Michener Award for outstanding public service journalism. Lynn considers her efforts to publish newspapers during the ice storm of 1998 and the blackout of 2003 to be two of her greatest achievements.



Brian Hanson, a Law and Security Customs/Immigration 1999 graduate, is a Customs Officer with Canada Customs and Revenue. He is assigned to the Marine Flexible Response Team in Saint John, New Brunswick, where he is one of only five members in the city trained in the operation of the new Vehicle and Cargo Inspection System. Brian is involved in the Missing Children Program, Big Brothers, Big Sisters and the Special Olympics.

Joe Roberts is one of those rags to riches stories that you don't believe can actually happen. After struggling with and overcoming drug addiction he has become head of a multimedia development company, Mindware Design Communications, in Vancouver. In less than four years, he led the company to an 800 per cent increase in business. He made his first million dollars before the age of 35. He is the founding member of Courage to Change, a foundation created to educate youth about drug and alcohol abuse. Joe graduated from Loyalist College in 1995 with diplomas in Business Marketing and Business Sales.

# Adrienne Fox-Keesic,

## *Photojournalism '00*

*"What is your dream?" was the question asked of Adrienne Fox-Keesic by her husband Glen. This question started her down the pathway to fulfilling her childhood wish to become a photojournalist. He didn't just ask, he listened to how she had wanted this since the age of 12 when she watched the movie 'All the President's Men'. He bought her a 35mm camera for her birthday.*

Adrienne is a member of the Bearskin Lake First Nation, a small remote Aboriginal community located in northwestern Ontario, which is only accessible by air. Most of her formative years were spent living in various communities and towns. Her stepfather worked for the Hudson's Bay Company, so as a family they moved a lot. She lived in Aboriginal communities in both northwestern Ontario and Northern Manitoba. After high school she sojourned into social work for awhile but after completing two years of study at the University of Manitoba, she decided social work was not for her. It raised too many issues for her that she felt needed a different venue of expression. She left her studies, got married and had three children. Adrienne tells us about her family...

*"They mean the world to me and honestly I don't think I'd be where I am now if it weren't for them. My husband*

*Glen Keesic, who is from the Lac Seul First Nation, is a gifted artist who paints wildlife. As well, he's the only artist I know who can fashion a lifelike eagle out of cardboard and duct tape. We have three children; Rachel is 17 years old and a computer whiz, Logan is nine and knows everything about automobiles, Brandon is the family's angel and he is 11 years old. Brandon was born developmentally delayed and needs around-the-clock care because he's essentially a baby. He doesn't speak but his eyes communicate every emotion under the sun. He can't sit up because his gross motor skills haven't developed beyond a three-month old. He's been our greatest challenge and our greatest teacher. Rachel developed a life-threatening kidney disorder while I was still*

*in college but thankfully she is now in remission, and we aim to keep her that way. Logan, I feel, will one day be engineering our vehicles or designing them. He's the youngest person I know that can name a car's make and model just by looking at them."*

Adrienne began working for the Wawatay News as a junior reporter immediately following her graduation from Loyalist. A few months later, in September 2000, she became editor. Unfortunately, with the combination of her daughter's health problems and caring for her aged grandfather there were challenges that she couldn't quite balance so she took a year off. She returned to the Wawatay News in 2002 as the senior news writer, the position she had initially wanted. Here, with the support of her editor, Bryan Phelan, she has been able to steadily develop her skills as an investigative reporter and

hone her skills as a photojournalist. The Wawatay News is a bi-weekly publication that allows her to do a lot of research and travelling. The community she lives in is Sioux Lookout, Ontario, a town with about 6,000 residents. It serves as a hub for some 29,000 Aboriginal people who flock from the north for shopping, medical care and secondary education. A forestry mill located nearby employs a large portion of the population. It also attracts a large number of tourists who travel there for fishing and camping. It's situated between the two major city centres of Winnipeg to the west and Thunder Bay to the east.

We asked Adrienne if she was involved in the community in addition to her job and family. "Presently, I'm a board member for the Sioux Lookout Anti-Racism Committee. Racism is an issue I feel strongly about. As an Aboriginal, I've had to experience the world a little differently because of my skin colour. I joined the board with the hope that I can help make a difference in the community that my children are being raised in."

She was unable to select one specific memory from Loyalist as her favorite, saying instead that her whole time here is a favorite memory. She loved the atmosphere created by the instructors and her classmates. "I especially liked the tone set by the former photojournalism coordinator, Steve Simon," she said. "He demanded excellence and also taught me to look beyond the curtain of traditional newspaper photography and look for the moments that defined the story I was trying to tell with my camera. Out of that encouragement grew my documentary style."

For a photojournalist whose career is only three years new, Adrienne has already earned the respect and recognition of her peers. "I think I've been lucky as far as being recognized not only by my peers but by my own people. I was honored last year by the people of the Nishnawbe Aski Nation – the region where I live and a region that encompasses much of northern Ontario – with an award that named me as Woman of

the Year. This award is given annually to Aboriginal women who work really hard towards their goals despite their personal difficulties. That award meant the world to me and it was humbling because I meet so many Aboriginal women that struggle against fantastic odds. In my eyes those are the ones who deserve that kind of award. For the past two years, I have been selected as a finalist by the Canadian Association of Journalists – first for an investigative award and then this year in the photojournalism category. In 2003 The Ontario Community Newspapers Association recognized me with four awards for my work at the Wawatay News which included First Place - Rural Journalism, Third Place for Photographer of the Year, Reporter of the Year and the Heritage Award and then an Honourable Mention for the Health and Wellness Award."

We talked about career goals. "What I can say is that eventually I would like to get the stories I do now out to a mainstream audience. There are a lot of important stories in this region that go unnoticed by mainstream media. I would like to somehow fill that void, but again I don't know how that would happen, at least not at this point in my career – a career that is still in its infancy. I've still got a lot of hard work ahead of me and a lot of learning to do as well."

When asked what she would need to achieve to feel successful in her career Adrienne responded... "Success is how you define it. If your definition of success is to work for a major magazine or become a newspaper photographer or a war photographer, that's how you'll define your success. It's a very personal journey. My personal definition of success is that I'm able to do what I love doing and get paid for it. How great is that!"

# Ryan Cuddy

## Lancer Men's Volleyball Assistant Coach

When Ryan Cuddy stepped into the Loyalist gym as a coach he was not a stranger to the College or the team. Ryan graduated from the Civil Technologist Program in 1997 and during his first year of playing for the Lancers they won the OCAA Championships. He described this as his most memorable moment at Loyalist. "We were underdogs, playing at home and won 15 – 13 in the fifth set, causing the entire gym to explode!" That year, Ryan was also named CCAA Academic All-Canadian.

Ryan grew up in the small town of Harlowe and attended North Addington Education Centre in Cloyne. After graduating from Loyalist he went on to the University of Toronto where he earned a Bachelor of Applied Science in Civil Engineering. He attended a recruiting session for Procter and Gamble in his final year and was impressed with the company's ethics and policies. After a lengthy hiring procedure he was offered a job in Belleville. He now lives in Flinton with his wife and two-year old daughter, both of whom make it to the majority of the home games.

Ryan described the influence he felt his Loyalist coaches played in his life. "My coaches here were Chris Carson and Ron Flieler. Chris epitomizes ethics, honesty and patience. Ron is very focused and hard-working. The two complement each other very well and have taught me the importance and benefit of diversity. I am very fortunate to be able to continue to learn from them now, as they are still on the coaching staff."

*"Chris epitomizes ethics, honesty and patience. Ron is very focused and hardworking. The two complement each other very well and have taught me the importance and benefit of diversity."*

When he was playing in high school, he was often a couple of years older than his team-

mates, so was always trying to help develop them. It was then he knew that some day he would like to coach. His favorite part is the moment when the athlete finally puts the knowledge and newly developed physical skills together. He has been with the team since the 2000/2001 season and feels that he contributes a good balance of patience and intensity to the coaching staff. He shared the excitement of the Nationals with them and was thrilled to see their hard work bring the team to that high level of achievement.

There are many challenges involved with developing a career while not only trying to meet time commitments, but to also build the plans and practices to develop the team. Ryan feels fortunate that the other coaches and his manager at Procter and Gamble are very flexible.

As with most things there are highlights and low points. Ryan described what he finds most frustrating as a coach. "I get frustrated when a player gives up. Whether it's trying to develop a new skill, passing a class, whatever."

The highlight of his coaching to date? "A league game this year versus Seneca. They were previously unbeaten, but we scouted, developed a plan, and the players executed it flawlessly, winning three games straight."

When asked what his coaching goal would be he replied without hesitation, "I love the guys I coach right now and I would love to develop them into a team that will win a medal at the Nationals."





pursue this goal. From 1989 until 1994 she owned and operated TANMAR Business Consulting Ltd., which had ten staff. In 1994 she sold the business and the building that housed it and moved to Yellowknife, Northwest Territories to work as a ministerial assistant for the Minister responsible for the Departments of Personnel and Renewable Resources. When the Minister was not re-elected a year later, she worked for the Department of Education on an Inuit Employment Plan for the government. From here she went on to a six-month contract for the Worker's Compensation Board and at the end of the six months was offered a permanent Director position. She remained with the WCB, in various capacities, for six years. In 2002 she was hired by the

Government of Saskatchewan as the Deputy Minister of Labour. During her career she has been able to travel: several times to Russia and Greenland, the European parliament in Brussels, and to Vietnam, and considers herself very lucky to have had these opportunities.

"I learned everything I needed to know at Loyalist to start and operate my own business. It was only as I accepted senior positions with governments that my spouse encouraged me to take my MBA as the cre-

dential on my resumé would make me more marketable in other areas of Canada," she explained. "He was right. When you apply for senior jobs you are screened-out unless you have an MBA, but having said that, there was nothing offered in my MBA that didn't just build on the foundation that I had learned at Loyalist. I consider my Loyalist time as my most valuable educational experience as I was able to leverage it into a wonderfully successful and diverse career."

When asked what her greatest sense of accomplishment in her career is, Christine spoke of two.

"When I was a business consultant, I was approached by a non-profit day care association that held a lease on a valuable piece of commercial land in Iqaluit, Nunavut on which they had to build within the year or they would lose the long-term lease, but they had no money at all. First I arranged for the group to get a government grant to hire me and then a mortgage from Canadian Mortgage and Housing Corporation with no equity or money down on the condition they build a daycare with four low-income rental apartments above it. The deal was that they would offer the apartments at very low subsidized rents to the director of their daycare (which would help them recruit a director) and to the directors of three other local daycares. Within the year, they had a building, a daycare and low-rental housing for the directors of four local daycares. It is one of the projects I worked on of which I am most proud as it didn't make money for a businessperson (most of my clients were businesspeople), but just improved the whole community."

"While at the WCB, I worked on the creation of a WCB that could be shared by two jurisdictions (the Northwest Territories and

Growing up in Halifax, Nova Scotia, Christine Tanner lived with her family in the house that her father has lived in since he was four years old. She received a scholarship to attend Mount Saint Vincent University where she completed her BA in 1980, with majors in Sociology and Religious Studies and a minor in Psychology. After graduating, Christine worked with several hotel chains in Halifax, then, in 1984 became the sales director with the Ramada Inn in Trenton. Twenty-four years old and frustrated by the limited opportunities to advance, Christine found herself at a crossroads. The choice she made brought her to Loyalist where she focused on absorbing business and accounting skills to assist her in accomplishing her career aspirations of owning her own business. She left Loyalist with diplomas in Business Administration and Accounting, confident that these studies had prepared her for the next chapter in her career.

After leaving Belleville, Christine's career took her to Igloolik, Nunavut to be an economic development officer, followed by a transfer to Iqaluit, Nunavut. A year later she began teaching business administration courses full-time at Arctic College. This was her all-time favorite job but she quit the year she was turning 30. She wanted to start her own business and knew that if she didn't do it then, that she would be trapped by the government pension and benefits and never

But due to economies of scale, it made sense in these two jurisdictions in order to keep the costs to employers down. It was a fun and challenging project – getting two governments to agree to share their political power and designing a structure that allowed two acts to create one entity."

When following Christine's career path you would wonder how she would find time for other pursuits, but here too she shines. Married, with two sons aged 12 and 13, she does admit that when she began working towards her MBA in 2001, her time revolved around family, career and studying. She completed her MBA in May this year. Prior to this demanding time commitment she was on a Catholic School Board, on the boards of a hospital, a public-housing authority, a women's shelter and the Chamber of Commerce, in addition to being a Rotary member in two different commun-

ties. She also was coordinator of her son's soccer league.

"In 2002, I went to Guatemala with World Vision Canada for a few weeks to help build houses for local residents. It was an eye-opening experience. After our box lunch one day, we were going to feed the scraps (literally a few mouthfuls of meat left on chicken bones,) to a starved dog that was hanging around nearby. The interpreter stopped us, to tell us that the people in the nearby fields wanted the scraps and they needed them more than the dog. These people then chewed on the bones that we had discarded. It made me ashamed that I had eaten anything and not just given my whole lunch away. We cannot imagine here in Canada that sucking on someone else's discarded bones would be considered a treat for others. I recommend everybody take such a trip."

Christine has resigned from her position as Saskatchewan's Deputy Minister of Labour. Being from the Atlantic Provinces, and having lived in areas with large lakes, trees, and

parklands, Christine and her husband miss these surroundings and the lifestyle that accompanies them. They are currently looking to relocate to either a small town in Ontario or further east and are coordinating the challenges of moving a two-career family.

"I met my two best friends while at Loyalist. They are Bonnie Maracle (currently finishing her PhD) and Carolyn Kiddie (who owns a vehicle body shop). We have been friends for 20 years and we try to get together for one weekend each year. The only rules for the weekend are 'No Men and No Kids'. Throughout the last 20 years we have been a strong support system for each other. We all loved our time there. There was even an instructors' strike while we were attending and it didn't dampen our appreciation for the College. It was a safe place to study. It was a caring and sharing environment and we were encouraged to dream and succeed. I can't speak highly enough about the grounding I received at Loyalist."

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"When I started with the Unemployment Insurance Commission I was hired as a part-time worker – one Saturday every six weeks. There were five other part-timers each of us working one Saturday. My job at that time was a Mainframe Computer Peripheral Operator. After about six months, three of the six part-timers left so I was then working one Saturday every three weeks.

Then two others quit and I was the only one who stuck it out and it paid off. I was working every Saturday plus management decided to put me on-call during the week. If someone called in sick, they would call me to work. This went on for about 18 months. In 1986, I became an indeterminate employee through a competitive process. I worked for 12 years in the Mainframe Computer area. In 1995, I moved onto Wide Area Network management, where I worked with a team of second Level Support Technicians to keep the 640 plus routers up and running across the Canadian-wide Human Resources Development Canada (HRDC) network. In 2001, I started my current position as Senior Systems Analyst – Fault Management Specialist with National Headquarters."
